This year is of course, Olympic & Paralympic year. London will become the first city to host the Games for a third time and because of that the organisers of the 2012 National Parliamentary Prayer Breakfast wished to choose a theme that would reflect the way in which the world of sport can inspire us in public life and in our personal faith – Peace.

The theme that was selected was the Olympic Truce, a resolution of the United Nations General Assembly that calls upon all signatories to pursue initiatives for peace and reconciliation in the spirit of the Ancient Games. This year all 193 Member States of the United Nations have given that undertaking before the General Assembly, representing an historic opportunity for London to leave a legacy that is more than gold.

Thank you again for sharing this event with us, we hope that you use it to strengthen your faith, broaden your friendships and inspire you to action so that together we serve and glorify the Prince of Peace in whose name we meet.



Bringing resolution to reality

The Olympic Truce

The purpose of the ancient Olympic Games was to enable fighting men to lay down their weapons without looking weak and to compete with each other under the same rules all together as Olympians. The Olympics were surrounded by the Sacred Olympic Truce, which guaranteed the safety of competitors, officials and spectators as they travelled to and took part in the Games. It was an incredible vision.

In the modern Olympics, the Olympic Truce was regarded as largely symbolic. However, this began to change, first with the introduction of the Olympic torch relay and then, in 1994, with the enshrining of the Olympic Truce in a Resolution of the United Nations General Assembly proposed by the host nation.

The first UN Resolution for the Olympic Truce was for the Lillehammer Winter Games in Norway. On the day before the Opening Ceremony, there was a devastating mortar bomb attack on the former Winter Olympic City of Sarajevo that was under siege at the time. For the first time the UN Olympic Truce Resolution was invoked to allow in vital medical supplies and humanitarian aid.

Sadly, since 1994, whilst most member states of the United Nations continue to sign the Olympic Truce Resolution, no-one has implemented it. Over the past few years there has been a campaign led by Christians in Parliament to seek a widespread implementation of the Olympic Truce for the London 2012 Games.

WALK FOR TRUCE.

In April 2011, Lord Bates set out on a solo walk from Olympia in Greece to Westminster, to highlight the Olympic Truce. In June 2011, in response to a question by Gary Streeter MP, the Prime Minister declared that the Olympic Truce represented "an historic opportunity" and pledged full government and diplomatic support for its implementation.

On 17 October 2011, the Resolution for the London 2012 Olympic & Paralympic Games was proposed to the United Nations General Assembly by the British Government and was not only signed by all 193 member states of the General Assembly of the United Nations, but also co-sponsored by them. This opens the way for a widespread meaningful implementation of the Olympic Truce during the London 2012 Olympic & Paralympic Games for the first time and is the reason we have chosen it as the theme for our National Parliamentary Prayer Breakfast as we gather together in the name of the Prince of Peace.

Tabitha Webb

Tabitha Webb is a musical theatre/classical singer and actress. She is from Kent and is of Anglo-Welsh descent. She gained a BA(Hons) from the Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama, followed by a post-graduate diploma from the Royal Academy of Music, graduating with distinction.

Her solo work, both classical and musical theatre, have included concerts with the English Symphonia, Bournemouth Symphony and the London Philharmonic orchestras. She has performed as soloist at venues such as St Martin in the Fields, St David's Hall, Cardiff, Brangwyn Hall, Wembley Conference Centre, the Barbican Centre, The Royal Festival Hall, The Royal Albert Hall and also on the field singing the national anthems at England international football matches!



Baroness Tanni Grey-Thompson

In Seoul in 1988, Tanni represented Great Britain and won her first Paralympic medal, the 400m bronze. At the 1992 Barcelona Paralympics, she won four gold medals in the 100, 200, 400 and 800 metres and a silver in the 4x100m relay. The same year, she won her first of six London Wheelchair Marathons. Tanni won the 800 metres gold in the 1996 Atlanta Paralympics along with three silver medals in the 100, 200 and 400 metres. At the 2000 Sydney Paralympics, she won gold four times in the 100, 200, 400 and 800 metres. In Athens 2004, aged 35, she won first place in the 100 and 400 metres, bringing her total Paralympic gold medal tally to eleven.

Since her retirement, Tanni has continued to be involved in sport. She is a director of UK Athletics and a member of the board of the London Marathon. In 2010, Tanni was appointed to the House of Lords, where she serves as a non-party political crossbench peer.

The Prayer Walk

The purpose of the walk between Westminster and the Olympic Park is to highlight the Olympic Truce proposed by the British Government as a United Nations resolution, which all 193 member nations have signed.

During the walk participants will be invited to pray for the safety of the Games, for a pause in conflicts around the world and for Christians to be peacemakers. We will gather at 10:30am around the Buxton Memorial Fountain in Victoria Tower Gardens.

At the end of the walk, we will reassemble near the Olympic Park at the Church of Our Lady and St Catherine of Siena for a short service of prayer and worship.

The distance of the walk is just over 7 miles and it is anticipated that it will take 2½-3 hours to complete.
