Our 'Local Offer' for Special Educational Needs and Disability (SEND)

All the teachers at Wadebridge School are teachers of children with special educational needs. As such Wadebridge School adopts a 'whole school approach' which involves all the staff adhering to a model of good practice. The staff of the school are committed to identifying and providing for the needs of all children, irrespective of need in an inclusive environment and in line with the outcomes of the Every Child Matters Agenda. Inclusion is regarded as crucial to the policy, in line with that of the Local Authority.

The school engages in an intensive transition programme for students joining us in Year 7, visiting their Primary School and organising a number of additional transition visits to ensure we know the students well before they join us in September, and have a plan in place to support their needs.

The special needs of the majority of our children are provided for within the framework of the normal curriculum with the emphasis on the quality of learning and the desire for all pupils to make significant progress. The school provides both short and long term specialist support and intervention programmes for students who need to boost their literacy, numeracy and social skills. We work closely with the English and Maths curriculum areas to ensure appropriate teacher-led support is in place for students who join us with low levels for Literacy and Numeracy; for example in Years 7 and 8 we have a classes studying the KS3 English Curriculum through Read Write Inc. Fresh Start and in Year 7 we use 'Power of 1 & 2' to support students who require help with Numeracy. We also use when necessary with identified pupils a Literacy intervention over a 6 week period called 'Sound Training' to help boost their reading ability.

The school employs a number of Teaching Assistants and Higher Level teaching assistants. Some are specialists in specific special educational needs while others work across a range of additional needs. They work with specific allotted children 1:1 or in small groups in both mainstream lessons and on individual learning programmes delivered in Curriculum Support. Interventions are carefully planned and targeted to specific pupils. The school also has an Autism Champion who has received specialist training in how to support students with ASD in a mainstream school setting.




The School's policy on Special Educational Needs complies fully with recent Government legislation and with the revised Code of Practice (Jan2015); it is monitored and reviewed regularly by both staff and Governors.






3. The curriculum

4. Teaching and learning

<p>The whole school uses a ‘dyslexia/dyscalculia-friendly’ approach to teaching and learning, where differentiated teaching and outcomes are used to ensure the progress of all students.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <input type="checkbox"/> The lessons are carefully planned to include clear stages, regular progress checks and different learning styles. <input type="checkbox"/> Different level groupings are identified for each class and students are made aware that at least some of the time they will be seated in ability groups. <input type="checkbox"/> Learning Objectives are displayed and discussed using “We are learning to...” <input type="checkbox"/> Differentiated Success Criteria are often displayed. <p>Work is regularly marked by teaching staff and students are encouraged to engage in their own reflection on the comments received. 

7. Social interaction opportunities
