New GCSE Grading Structure



Reformed GCSEs will be introduced gradually over three years from September 2015. They will be graded from 9 to 1, instead of A* to G.

Students awarded GCSEs in 2017 and 2018 will therefore receive a mixture of 9 to 1 and A* to G grades.

Students will not lose out as a result of the changes. We will use a statistical method (known as comparable outcomes) so that:

- broadly the same proportion of students will achieve a grade 4 and above as currently achieve a grade C and above;
- broadly the same proportion of students will achieve a grade 7 and above as currently achieve a grade A and above;
- the bottom of grade 1 will be aligned with the bottom of grade G;
- a grade 5 will be awarded to the top third of students gaining the equivalent of a grade C or bottom third of a grade B. The Department for Education has decided that grade 5 will be a 'good pass'.

In addition, the top 20 per cent of those who get a grade 7 or above in each exam will be awarded a grade 9

Active revision involves you actually doing something with the information you are trying to learn and not just sitting there storing at a revision guide or textbook: Active revision techniques allow you to chunk down course content and process it in a number of ways, making it easier for you to learn it Remember, people revise but in different ways. In other words, the most effective revision technique is a personal thing so choose what works well for you so long as it is an active technique: This is ESSENTAL to allow your brain to learn, make connections and remembater



- 2. Condense your revision notes onto small indexicards or blank postcards with just the key facts. and key words.
- 8. Draw spider diagrams & memory maps with small pictures, symbols and key words.

Particularly effective for visual learners and helps to show how concepts are linked together.

- 4. Use colours and highlighters to emphasise important parts of you notes.
- 5. Write keywords or concepts on post it notes and stick them all over the house so you can chall lence yourself as you walk around (the back of the tollet door is an old favourite so you can revise.

- 6. Use minemonics, rhymes or even songs to help you remember things.
- 7. Practise doing past exam gapers that your teacher has given you. Then use the mark scheme or your textbook/inches to mark your answers.
- 8. Ask a friend or garent to test you by asking you questions, using a revision guide, textbook your own notes.
- 9. Record your revision notes onto your IPod and then play them walking down the street or dur-Ing your paper round!
- 10. Use one of the websites recommended to you by your teacher but don't just suff the weblooking for revision websites because you will get distracted and the site might not be suitable f the CCSE course you did.

What works well?

Home study support and Revision

Strategy	Support
Environment	Create space, remove distractions, provide materials, move around
Testing	Quick quiz using revision guides/cue cards
Study plans	Produce planning sheets, discuss timing, create time, plan for sufficient sleep
Flash/cue cards	Provide cue cards, encourage, use for testing, help with time management
Mind maps/visual notes	Provide paper, coloured pens, provide positive feedback, ask about links and examples

Remove phone, block WiFi, monitor focus, access recommended equipment/resources

Quick quizzes and tests given often No need to know answers Just read from book/cue card

25 minute sessions +5 minute breaks Add specific activities Consider daily routines

Divide up topics and use word lists from teachers/revision guides
Revisit frequently

Encourage the use of images and key words as reminders - no need to be good at Art. Look for connections & overlap

Use the web site for help and examples of activities
