Literature: Put your understanding of chaos to use. Explore a range of conflict poetry and context behind the poems.

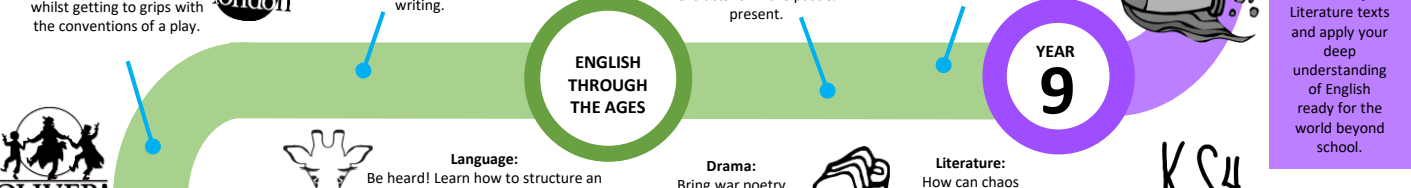


Literature: What the Dickens? Get a taste for Victorian London. Explore Dickens' 'Oliver' whilst getting to grips with the conventions of a play.

Literature: Immerse yourself in Literature across time. Track the journey English using an anthology of extracts from the past & present.

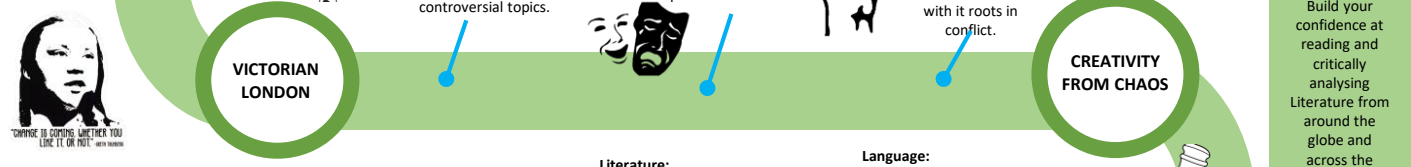
Language: You've reached the last of the transactional writing tasks. Keep it informal with this letter writing unit.
